This summary covers twenty-one state bank and trust companies, savings banks and three national banks, at close of business December 31, 1909.

A statement showing the condition of Memphis banks from June 30, 1909, to December 31, 1909, shows an increase in assets of \$6,889,327.32, against the increase shown in the yearly statement of \$6,752,282.47. This does not include the amount of the dividends that have been paid out.

This feature of a more rapid increase of deposits than of borrowings reflects the improvement in the condition of business, showing that obligations have been reduced and there is to the credit of people larger amounts. From the standpoint of the banker it is likewise healthy, as this is the period when he wants to see loans paid and obligations met. Lean deposits and large loan accounts mean that credits have been extended and that business is being done too much with other people's money.

Dividend and interest disbursements will be the largest ever made here, and will probably run between \$750,000 and 2,651,876.52 \$1,000,000, including banks and corpora-20,772.49 tions, public and private. This money 1,382.21 always seeks immediate investment and the impetus thereof will be felt in many

When it is remembered that the stock of cotton here is over 210,000 bales, and in value much larger than ever in the city's history, and that more than 100,-000 bales have now been sold by factors, the showing is all the more remarkable. There is tied up in this stock alone near-

ly \$17,000,000, though much of this has been drawn and expended and is in circulation. Further material increase in deposits is expected during the next few weeks.
