Max Goltman, M. D., C. M., F. A. C. S., is a native of Glasgow, Scotland, where he was born on May 24, 1867, the son of Solomon and Cecilia Tobias Goltman. He was educated for the practice of medicine at McGill University, and Bishops' College, Montreal, Quebec, Canada, and took post-graduate work in Edinburgh, Glasgow, London, Boston, and Baltimore, before coming to Memphis in 1895 to establish a practice.

He was married, on Dec. 12, 1894, to Miss Molly Sternberg, the daughter of Solomon and Hannah Unna Sternberg, and they had five children. Mrs. Goltman died on July 2, 1931.

Alfred Meyer Goltman, the oldest son, is a graduate of Columbia University, New York, and has been associated with his father in the practice of medicine since his graduation. He married Miss Helen Hirsch, and they have twin daughters, Peggy and Jean, 9. Hannah Louise, the second oldest, is the wife of J. D. Shroder, and the mother of three youngsters, Bobby, 10; Joan, 8; and David, 6.

Jack Sternberg and David William, the next two sons, are both following the medical profession as well, Jack having graduated from Cornell, and being at present an interne at Mt. Sinai Hospital, New York; and David, a graduate of the University of Pennsylvania, being an interne at the Children's Memorial Hospital, Chicago.

Maxine Cecilia, the youngest, is the wife of Maurice Caheen, of Birmingham, Ala., and the mother of two children, Molly Ann, 6, and Ned, 3.

Dr. Goltman is a past president of the Memphis Board of Health, having filled that office from 1910 to 1914.
